#### Renew Your License By July 1

If you currently are licensed in North Dakota as a Licensed Registered Dietitian or a Licensed Nutritionist a renewal application has been mailed to your address on file with NDBODP. Renewal applications were mailed May 24 so if you haven't received one please contact NDBODP or download one from www.ndbodp.com under *applications and renewals*. Renewal applications are due July 1, 2012. Late fees of \$10/month are assessed for applications postmarked July 2 and after.

#### Renewal Form Has A Few Changes

The renewal form has been slightly revised from last year. Some of the changes include:

- Listing the last 4 digits of your social security number.
- Listing your CDR number instead of sending in a copy of your CDR card.
- An attestation statement; please be sure to read the statement and sign/date it. Applications cannot be processed without your signature.

#### Practicing Dietetics Without A License—Is It Illegal?

According to North Dakota Statute it is illegal to practice dietetics or call yourself a dietitian in ND without a license. Therefore it is important you complete your license renewal application and send it with your payment on time. In the event a renewal application is not received by September 30 the license of the individual is considered expired. A person whose license has expired but who continues to practice as a dietitian or use a restricted title violates state law. Such a violation is a class B misdemeanor under NDCC 43-44-17. NDBODP could refer any dietitian practicing without a license to the local law enforcement agency having jurisdiction for investigation and potential prosecution. NDBODP is also authorized to bring a civil action for an injunction to restrain violations under NDCC 43-44-16. Such violations are grounds for denying an application by the former licensee for renewal of the expired license or for a new license.

# **Delegate Update**

#### **Continuum of Professional Progression & Growth**

"If we are growing, we're always going to be out of our comfort zone." - John Maxwell

The House of Delegates conducted two dialogue sessions on the continuum of professional preparation and growth (part 1 and part 2) on April 26 and 27, 2012. The purpose of the first dialogue was to: 1) Reach a common understanding of the opportunities for growth represented by the continuum of professional preparation; 2) Create a better understanding of the career development guide and how it guides practitioners to grow into new opportunities; and, 3) Identify tools and resources for delegates to use to communicate common understanding across the profession. The purpose of the second dialogue was to: 1) Establish an understanding of the importance of advanced practice to the future of the nutrition and dietetics profession; and, 2) Create a vision for the future of nutrition and dietetics profession that includes advanced practice.

The current revised Motion #1 as of May 7, 2012. This motion may still be amended and is subject to a final vote.

#### The House of Delegates recommends that:

- All dietetics practitioners understand and implement the Dietetics Career Development Guide as a tool to assist them in achieving the highest potential level of practice.
- CDR incorporates the Dietetics Career Development Guide into the Professional Development Portfolio process and encourages its utilization by all credentialed practitioners.



- All Academy organizational units support the utilization of the Dietetics Career Development Guide in appropriate projects, initiatives, policies, tools and resources designed for students and practitioners.
- The HOD dialogue summaries will be forwarded to the Council on Future Practice for use in developing new Dietetics Career Development Guide tools and resources specific for students and practitioners to utilize.
- Individual members are encouraged to perform outcomes research that measures the financial impact and the career growth opportunities of advanced practice.

If you are not familiar with the Career Development Guide visit the <u>ADA website</u>, members tab, left side of page click on practice, then Council on Future Practice and Dietetics Career Development Guide. This model was developed as a guide for practitioners as a model reflecting advance practice credentialing and the continuum of practice. The Council on Future Practice, the House Leadership Team, the Commission on Dietetic Registration and the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics with input from the House of Delegates will continue to synthesize the work that is currently in motion.

## Congratulations to the 2012 NDDA Award Winners!



During the NDDA membership meeting April 24, awards were given to North Dakota dietitians to recognize significant achievement in the field of nutrition and dietetics.

The Outstanding Dietetic Educator award was given to Dr. Yeong Rhee, Associate Professor at North Dakota State University. Dr. Rhee leads medical nutrition therapy classes for undergraduate students and is the major advisor of several graduate students. Her research includes chronic disease prevention. Dr. Rhee has been in the department of Health, Nutrition and Exercise Sciences at NDSU for nine years and has mentored many dietetic students.

The Recognized Young Dietitian of the Year Award went to Dustin Frize, a UND graduate and team leader for UND Dining Services. Frize is credited with implementing "green" programs for UND dining.

# **Public Policy Update**

ND Department of Human Services Medical Division recently made changes to the Medicaid coding guideline for Medical Nutrition Therapy (MNT). Our coverage has not changed; however, some of the diagnosis codes were updated. For example, the diagnosis code of 790.2 now requires a fifth digit so the following codes have been added:



790.21 Impaired fasting glucose

792.22 Impaired glucose tolerance test (oral)

790.29 Other abnormal glucose

For a listing of additional covered diagnosis codes refer to pages 8 and 9.
